In 2004, the Texas Coastal Watershed Program, a joint effort between the Texas Cooperative Extension and Texas Sea Grant, received funding to facilitate and conduct wetland restoration and

education within the Greater East End community of Houston, and specifically host an environmental educa-



tion/environmental awareness festival called "La Cuenca Cuenta: A Watershed Fiesta" The festival name "La Cuenca Cuenta has a dual meaning: "The Watershed Counts or The Watershed Tells a Story". Utilizing the dual meaning, the festival will focus on watershed issues:

- Our impact on local water quality
- Variety of native habitats within the watershed
- Importance of various habitats within the watershed



- How we can improve our water quality
- How we can reduce our impacts on habitats

The Watershed Fiesta will incorporate arts aspects, such as music, dance and especially storytelling, weaving the Latino culture through various displays in the festival. Students from local high schools will participate as volunteers and support staff for various booths.



In 2005, there was a great turnout with 300 adults and kids participating from the community. Next year the hopes are for an increase in attendance as well as sponsorships from area businesses.
